Opening Liturgy

The Holy Family: Listen! I am standing at the door, knocking; if you hear my voice and open the door, I will come in to you and eat with you, and you with me. (Revelation 3:20)

Leader: Who will give lodging to these pilgrims who are weary of traveling the roads?

The Holy Family: I have come exhausted from Nazareth: a carpenter, by the name of Joseph. In the name of the heavens, I beg you for lodging, my beloved wife can no longer travel.

People: Although you tell us that you are weary, we do not give lodging to strangers. We don't care what your name is; let us sleep. We are telling you that we will not let you enter.

Holy Family: He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God. (John 1:10, 12)

People: Who are the children of God?

Holy Family: All who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. (Romans 8:14)

People: To what does the Spirit of God guide us?

Holy Family: You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. You shall love your neighbor as yourself. (Matthew 22:37, 39) The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self—control. (Galatians 5:22–23a)

People: How do we know we love the Lord and have faith?

Holy Family: What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead. (James 2:14–17)

People: Lodging we will give you with much happiness; enter, good Joseph; enter with Mary. Enter, holy pilgrims. Receive this corner not of this humble home, but of our hearts.
